OPERATIONAL READINESS AND SECURITY SYSTEMS INSPECTIONS, TESTS AND EVALUATIONS (ORSITE) FOR THE PHILIPPINE COAST GUARD

1. <u>PURPOSE</u>: To provide a standard procedure for the conduct of Operational Readiness and Security Systems Inspections, Test and Evaluations (ORSITE) by inspectors from the Office of the Coast Guard Internal Affairs Service (O/CGIAS) of all PCG units ashore.

2. <u>GENERAL PROVISIONS:</u>

a.) Operational readiness and unit security are basic responsibilities of a command. Commanders of all echelons of the PCG have the responsibility of keeping their respective units and facilities as operationally ready and prepared for inspection, test and evaluation anytime.

b.) By being operationally secured, a unit or detachment should be able to react to any situation that would threaten the performance of its missions and the security of its personnel and facilities. Likewise, it should be able to respond to requirements for civil disturbance control, relief and rehabilitation, conflagration or any other contingencies within the unit's area of responsibility. Such reactions are to be in accordance with the unit's defense and contingency plans.

c.) Coast Guard Internal Affairs Service (CGIAS) is tasked to conduct Operational Readiness and Security Systems Inspections, Test and Evaluations (ORSITE) to all PCG units ashore.

d.) This activity shall be conducted simultaneously with the Annual General Inspection (AGI) and Morale And Discipline Survey (MADS). However, modified ORSITE may be conducted to a particular unit located/situated in threatened areas, as directed by the Commandant, PCG.

3. **PROCEDURE**:

a.) Mission Orders duly signed by the Commander, CGIAS shall be issued and shall be the basis in the conduct of ORSITE (Annex A).

b.) The mission orders shall specify the following:

1. PCG Unit to be inspected

2. Members of the team designated to conduct the said activity

3. Mission number and the duration of the mission

c. The ORSITE Team shall conduct briefing before carrying out the mission or introducing any situational problem

d.) Situation of the Unit subject for inspection such as mission, resource capabilities, manning and security status, morale and other related information shall be considered. Reports of previous ORSITE conducted to the unit may be used as reference to identify its weak areas and strong points. With these data on hand, situational problems can be drawn up and given to the inspected units to test its reaction (Annex B - sample of situational problem).

e.) The inspection is a No-Notice type or need not be announced. However, the Unit Commander must be informed of the mission as soon as possible. The entry of the Team to the Unit to be inspected may be by normal means or by simulated enemy intrusions. The Team is required to exercise extra precautions to prevent the happening of any untoward incidents within the area or upon the organic personnel of the Unit and the inspecting team. Coordination with the local peace and order entities may also be made as an additional security measure considering that most of the Units to be inspected are situated in the populous area.

f.) Upon the introduction of the situational problem, the team shall look into the existing defense and contingency plan of the Unit being inspected to determine whether its reactions conform with the said plan. Evaluators/ inspectors shall refer to the checklist herein attached as Annex C (CHECKLIST FOR ORSITE).

g.) In evaluating the unit on the aspect of its operational readiness and security, the following should be looked into, using the attached ORSITE checklist in Annex D (EVALUATION CHECKLIST):

- 1. Unit Description, Mission and Classification
- 2. Personnel Status
- 3. Previous unit training conducted
- 4. Logistic status
- 5. Status of contingency plan
- 6. Reaction to situations
- 7. Mustering of troops
- 8. Appropriateness of solutions to problems given during ORSITE

9. Other data as appropriate to give objectivity to the ORSITE

4. <u>REPORTS</u>

a. ORSITE Report shall be submitted immediately after the completion of activity to the Chairman, AGI Team, if the activity is conducted simultaneously with AGI/MADS;

b. The Chairman, AGI Team shall forward the consolidated report to the Commandant, PCG. He shall also furnish the Unit inspected copy of the ORSITE Report for appreciation and corrective action.

c. In the event the ORSITE is conducted separately with AGI/MADS, the report shall be submitted to the Commandant, PCG within five days after the completion of the activity. Concerned Unit shall also be furnished with the ORSITE Report for appreciation and corrective action.

d. Format of ORSITE Report is hereto attached as Annex E (ORSITE REPORT).

5. **<u>RESPONSIBILITY</u>**:

CGIAS shall be responsible and ensure the proper conduct of this activity.

6. <u>RESCISSION:</u>

This SOP rescinds previous SOP's on ORSITE and ORE of PCG units.

7. <u>EFFECTIVITY</u>: This SOP takes effect upon approval.

SITUATION II (TO BE HANDED TO AT H)

A SERIES OF EXPLOSIONS WERE HEARD FROM THE VICINITY OF DONA EVA MACAPAGAL SUPER TERMINAL. AFTERWARDS, ABOUT FIFTEEN (15) HEAVILY ARMED MEN ONBOARD A TINTED PASSENGER VAN SUDDENLY STOPPED INFRONT HPCG GATE NR 2 AND FIRED AT THE DUTY ROVING AND GANGWAY WATCH KILLING THEM INSTANTLY.

SITUATION III (TO BE HANDED TO _____ AT ____ H)

TWO (2) DISGRUNTLED PCG PERSONNEL ARMED WITH HAND GRENADES EARLIER POSING AS FISHERMEN AT THE BACK OF MANILA HOTEL SURREPTITIOUSLY ENTERED AT THE BACK OF HSG GALLEY AT SECTOR NR 4. AFTERWARDS, TWO (2) GRENADE EXPLOSIONS WERE HEARD.
